Bluebirds Nest in Gourd on Porch

To our knowledge, Seminole County in Central Florida, does not have many nesting bluebirds. As in other parts of the state, this may be due to limited nesting cavities. Bluebirds with a desire to nest are continuing to prove they will use what is available. This spring, a pair of bluebirds chose to nest in a decorative gourd on a porch in Longwood.

This Spring Shirley Reilly provided our first report of bluebirds in Longwood. She has multiple Carolina wrens and Northern cardinals in her yard, and it is not uncommon for her to see them near her porch. She began to notice a different bird in the yard this year. It was not until the male bluebird was sighted that she realized her new bird was a female bluebird



Imagine her surprise when she happened to look out of her window as the female bluebird was exiting a gourd she had hung on her porch for decoration. The next day she saw the bluebird enter the gourd with pine needles in her beak. A few days later, she happened to see the bluebird exit the gourd. She was ready with a mechanic's

mirror to take a quick look inside. Sure enough there were six blue eggs in a nest that the bluebird had constructed in the gourd!

As evidenced by these images, it was a successful nest. Five of the eggs hatched and fledged from this unlikely nest location.

Time to Clean and Repair Nestboxes

Nesting season has ended and now is the time to prepare for next season. We suggest you not only clean out your boxes, but take a good look at them. If you see anything about your box that might pose a hazard to birds now is the time to make repairs. Do leave your boxes in place as birds will take shelter in them during cold weather.



We Want Your Nesting Season Data

Part of the FBS Mission is the collection and dissemination of pertinent data. When we first organized, it was agreed that nesting data would be one of our priorities.

If you participate with Cornell's NestWatch program and have already submitted your data that is all you need to do. We are hoping to work with Cornell to share their data for bluebirds in Florida. If you have not submitted data to NestWatch we ask that you share it with us.

What is a Bluebird Blitz?

A Blitz is a concentrated effort on a specific target date to locate as many Eastern Bluebirds in your locale as possible.

Why a Bluebird Blitz?

The Blitz, November 6 & 7, 2015, will help us to know where the Bluebirds find food and survival habitat between the end of the breeding season and migration time, until breeding activity begins again

How to participate

Simply choose a location, count the number of bluebirds you see, and send us a report of your sightings. We offer three ways to submit your sightings.

- 1. Enter your data on a spreadsheet and email it to <u>floridabluebirdsociety@gmail.com</u>. The spreadsheet is attached to the email with this newsletter.
- 2. A report form can be downloaded from our website. Record your results on the downloaded form. Immediately after the Blitz either email the completed form to <u>floridabluebirdsociety@gmail.com</u>, or mail it to: Faith Jones, FBS Statewide Bluebird Blitz Chair, 763 Mallard Drive, Sanford Fl 32771.
- 3. Enter you sightings at ebird.org. If you are a Cornell NestWatch participant, you will use the same login and password to access ebird.org.
